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V. COLLEGE ISSUES

A. Student Success: Employer Panel and Mock Interviews

Cathy Allard, FVCC Career Advisor and two of Dr. Phil MacGregor's Computer Applications students, Thomas Shea and Julie Sonderegger, shared information about the recent employer panel and mock interviews that were held on campus. This event has taken place for several years, this year, it was two-hours and featured eight representatives from six different Information Technology employers. The first hour was a brief introduction where students could ask questions and employers could share trends in the industry and who they hire. The second hour was reserved for four mock interviews with a 10 minute time limit to try and rotate through as many as possible. Both Thomas and Julie are in their second year of the Computer Applications program. They felt that the event was beneficial and would recommend allowing more time for interviews in the future.

At the end of May, a similar event will be held for the Physical Therapy Assistant students and employers. There have also been more open employer panels as well, they have been done with existing faculty curriculum, there is better student participation when the faculty is endorsing it as part of their coursework.

B. Finance and Audit Committee Report

- 1. FY21 Review of Financial Statement and Audit
- 2. Quarterly Finance Report Quarter End March 31, 2022

Barry Weber, Senior Audit Manager with Eide Bailly, gave a presentation on the results of the FY21 financial statement audit. President Karas congratulated the Finance team on a clean audit. Beckie Christiaens, Vice President of Administration and Finance/CFO summarized the Finance and Audit Committee meeting which immediately preceded the Board Meeting. Unexpended CARES revenue replacement money is able to be carried over to 2023.

3. Tuition and Fee Consideration for FY23

President Karas shared the Budget Committee's recommendations for FY23. The Committee did not recommend an increase in tuition. A \$3.00 per credit increase in fees was recommended for all residency categories. An e-mail was sent to all students asking for their opinions and two student forums were held to give them a chance to comment on the proposed increase. One student responded to the e-mail who was in favor of the 0% tuition increase, but not the \$3.00/credit increase. Four students attended the forums and agreed that they would prefer not to have any increase in tuition or fees, but a few understood the need to increase fees even though they didn't support it. President Karas felt confident that there is financial support through financial aid opportunities and funding through the Foundation that would be able to help those students who find the \$84.00 in increased fees for the year to be a challenge. Trustee Kelly Stimpson moved that the Board approve the recommended \$3.00 per credit increase in fees across all residency categories, for a total increase of \$84.00 in fees for the year. Trustee Shannon Lund seconded the motion. With no further discussion, the motion passed unanimously with six (6) "yes" votes.

C. Board of Trustees Events Calendar

The Registered Nurse Pinning Ceremony will take place on May 13th at 3:00 p.m. Commencement will also be held on May 13th on campus under the tent at 6:00 p.m. The Board of Regents will be meeting May 18th-19th in Havre. The May Board of Trustees meeting will be

on the 23^{rd} . Summer Semester begins May 23^{rd} . The College will be closed on May 30^{th} in observance of Memorial Day. The June Board of Trustees meeting will be on the 27^{th} . The FVCC Adult Education Graduation is on June 28^{th} at 6:00 p.m. Tickets are on sale for the Foundation's Summerfest on June 30^{th} at The Nest in Bigfork. The College will be closed on the 4^{th} of July in observance of Independence Day. The Mountain States Association of Community Colleges meeting is July 7^{th} - 8^{th} . The Board of Regents meeting will be July 14^{th} - 15^{th} in Helena and the July Board of Trustees meeting will be on the 25^{th} .

D. President's Report

President Karas updated the Board on several items:

- The College Center is continuing to move forward with an expected completion date in early September. President Karas and Beckie Christiaens are working with the Department of Administration with the State to apply for ARPA funds.
- Community College Funding Formula The Interim Budget Committee for Section E will meet on June 15th and 16th to look at the values for the funding formula. All three community colleges will meet with the legislative fiscal analyst who represents the Committee, one of the budget staff people from the Commission of Higher Education's Office, and a staff member from the Office of Budget and Planning from the Governor's Office. This group will discuss recommendations and options for the Committee to consider. Until those values are set, we will not know what the funding formula will be starting in FY24.
- Legislative Audit Committee A hearing was held with the Committee this morning with Barry Weber from Eide Bailly.
- Employee Appreciation Dinner The FVCC Leadership group and the President's Council have been discussing ways to get employees more connected and integrated again after the COVID silos. An all employee appreciation dinner will take place on May 10th under the graduation tent. All Board members are invited to attend.
- Monthly Gatherings In March the IT Department hosted an all employee gathering in the Eagle's Nest with refreshments and IT trivia. The April gathering was hosted by the President's Office in the Eagle's Nest and featured a Peeps Diorama contest.
- The Association of Community College Trustees Convention Registrations for the October Conference in New York are due by the end of May.
- New Board of Trustee Orientation The two new Trustees will meet with Chairperson Akey and President Karas for orientation on May 11th.

VI. EXECUTIVE SESSION

A. President's Annual Performance Evaluation

Chairperson Akey announced that the Board would go into Executive Session to discuss the President's Annual Performance Evaluation. It was determined that the demand of individual privacy clearly exceded the merits of public disclosure and therefore he would close the meeting. Student Activities Report April 2022

Several clubs are meeting on a regular basis and planning activities for the remainder of the semester. The Native American Student Association hosted a grocery bingo event in March. Genders and Sexualities Alliance is planning a Tie Dye event on April 1st in the Student Lounge. The Chess Club received a new advisor this month and continues to host chess games on a weekly basis. Intervarsity Christian Fellowship spent time during spring break volunteering at the Lighthouse Christian Home. Following the service project, they hosted a mini retreat. Weekly bible studies are held in the Student Lounge. Mask and Hammer wrapped up their musical and hosted auditions for the next show.

Phi Theta Kappa Honor Society is gaining momentum by hosting weekly meetings to rebuild their membership. Two open house events were hosted and their spring induction ceremony is set for April 18th at 4pm in BH 140. PTK is also partnering with the FVCC Library to host a study session on May 7th from 10-6 pm. They will be providing free snacks and beverages for all in attendance.

The Computer Club is busy learning new security software and installing the Kali Linux Operation System on older computers donated by the IT Department. Once everything is setup, they will start attacking the computers to see if they can hack the system.

Student Government continues to host a photo contest to collect pictures for the student lounge. Recruitment efforts for the 2022-23 school year have begun. The Interclub Council meets on a regular basis to collect monthly club reports and has started the 2022-23 allocation of \$28,500 in student activity fees.

The Student Wellness Team has continued to host Mindful Mondays every Monday from 12:30pm to 1:00pm in the Student Lounge. Other activities included a "Microwaved Chopped" event on March 18. This was a mini cooking competition that involved making simple dishes from and assortment of healthy ingredients. The team also received QPR (suicide intervention) training. Plans are being made for Sexual Assault Awareness Month activities in April.

In March 2022 Campus Rec had about 60 students attend events with many attending multiple programs. Intramural basketball has continued to increase in number of attendees. Other events held were a Mario Kart tournament, grocery bingo and trivia, and two Bob Ross paint nights. There were fewer events this month due to spring break.

For service projects, a Habitat for Humanity Build Day was hosted on March 12. Students enjoyed working alongside an AmeriCorps National Civilian Community Corps team learning how to prep and install siding on a new home in Lakeside, MT. Several students will be returning in two weeks to volunteer again. In an effort, to meet the critical need for blood donations, a Red Cross Blood Drive was held on March 9 in AT 139. The turnout was fabulous with a record setting 48 donors and 45 pints of blood collected. This included 11 new donors.
