45		Several PTK officers and members attended the Student Leadership Development
46		Program workshop in November. We learned how to run an effective meeting. We also
47		had our Fall Induction Ceremony on the November 29. We had a little over half of the
48		new inductees attend. After the ceremony, almost everyone stayed around to eat cake and
49		visit for an hour. We have been focusing a quite a bit of our time completing the

necessary requirements to become a 5-Star Chapter. Two of those requirements being our Honors in Action project and our College Project. We are on track for completing both and reaching our goal of becoming a 5-star chapter status.

## **Student Government**

A wide variety of breakout sessions were attended in regards to building an exceptional peer education program focusing in the areas of health, safety, and student leadership. ## B. Faculty

Faculty presented the Board with a written Faculty report.

**Don Hickethier, Mike Severino, Erin Wenner, and Laura VandeKop** all attended the annual American Mathematical Association of Two Year Colleges (AMATYC) in Denver, 11/16 - 11/20. Don presented a talk on algebraic issues faced by Differential Equation (& Calculus) teachers. Erin & Laura presented a talk on our Foundational Math program, our new M094-Quantitative Reasoning course, and our math pathways for foundational math. Mike spent time looking into research at the two-year college level and ways to integrate math research in with other disciplines. All attended some very informative and inspiring sessions to help them in their classrooms.

The FVCC Agriculture Program hosted the 14th Annual Montana Organic Association Conference from December 1-3, 2016. The conference attracted over 200 farmers, research scientists, students, and agricultural experts from across Montana and the surrounding region. Highlights included a keynote address from Dr. John Reganold, Regents Professor of Soil Science at Washington State University, many informative seminars, farm tours in the Kalispell area, and a student poster competition in which FVCC students presented their agriculturally-related research to an array of industry professionals. The conference provided Dr. Heather Estrada with the opportunity to showcase the Agriculture program and the FVCC campus. Many conference-goers commented on the vibrancy of the campus and spoke about their favorable impression of the College, and its students and staff.

**The Music Program** did their first ever Jury Exams for the private instruction students. These are done at every other university across Montana and are a big deal for the MUSI 195 & 295 courses. The Choral Ensemble performed at the Faculty Christmas Party on Saturday. This was their third performance this semester.

# C. Monthly Reports

## 1. Executive Staff Activities Report

The Board of Trustees thanked the Executive Staff for their informative reports. Trustees noted all the hard work faculty and staff do every day to continue to make FVCC an amazing place for students.

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# D. Commissioner of Higher Education Report

Erik Rose, Compliance and Workforce Data Analyst, provided the Board with an update from the Commissioner's Office. Mr. Rose provided the Board with an overview of HealthCARE Montana. HealthCARE Montana is connecting employer and education partners to develop high quality, locally accessible, industry relevant training opportunities. Adult learners, including rural workers, veterans, Native Americans, and unemployed Montanans are being trained for high-demand, high-skilled, and highly-paid jobs in the healthcare industry. HealthCARE Montana is expanding access to nursing and allied health programs through distance technology, work-based learning experiences, and homegrown innovations. HealthCARE MT has directly served over 1,700 students with a total of over 5,000 students enrolled in healthcare courses (including pre-requisites). Faculty from 15 campuses representing 155 healthcare programs and over 200 industry representatives are working together to address healthcare workforce shortages. HealthCARE MT has seen a 20-25% reduction in time and up to an \$8,300 reduction in cost for each of the Practical Nursing, Certificate of Applied Science and Associate of Science Registered Nursing programs. In addition, there has been a 20% reduction in time and up to an \$9,500 reduction in cost to transition from an ASN to a Bachelor of Science Registered Nurse (BSN). HealthCARE MT is looking to offer Allied Health Core Curriculum of common foundational and core competencies via distance delivery. In addition, math and Anatomy and Physiology requirements will be streamlined across allied health and nursing programs and across colleges.

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## V. COLLEGE ISSUES

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#### A. Student Success: Adult Basic Education (ABE)

Margaret Girkins, Director, Adult Basic Education, presented the Board with an update on the current Adult Basic Education Program. The Adult Basic Education Program offers the high school diploma equivalency test, HiSet (High School Equivalency Test). This test gives students the same diplomea as the GED. Students are able to enroll in the free class to help them study and pass the HiSet test. Students take the TABE (Test of Adult Basic Ed) assessment to determine their skills and then would enroll in and Adult Education Course. The course is a fiveweek block class that will prepare the students to take the HiSet. During the 2015/2016 academic year, 309 students took the TABE assessment and 234 students logged 12 or more hours in the ABE program. A graduation for those students who successfully completed the program and passed the HiSet will be held on Wednesday, January 18, at 5:30 pm in the Arts and Technology Building, Room 139. This graduation will have 60-70 graduates who will receive their certificate of completion. In addition, the ABE Program also offers English as a Second Language (ESL) classes. Students receive an increased understanding of American culture and improve their English speaking, writing, reading and math skills. ESL also provides classes in US citizenship preparation. Currently there are about 25 students who are or have recently participated in ESL classes.

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# B. 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Update

Heidi, Hickethier, Director, Foundation Development, presented the Board with an update on the college's 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Celebration. The 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Steering Committee has been meeting and planning a great year to celebrate FVCC's 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary. The year will feature a series of commemorative events, publications and videos that will highlight the achievements of the last five decades. The 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Commemorative Publication will go out in January. The publication will look back at the history of the college to present day. The college will be locating 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary flags with the 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary logo at entrances and exits to campus. In addition, the 50<sup>th</sup> Kickoff event will be held on February 2<sup>nd</sup> with guest speaker Garrett Garrels. A Founder's Day Celebration will be held on April 7 followed by the Festival of Flavors Springfest on April 8.

#### F. Resolution 17-5, Donation and Conveyance of Land

The college has been given an opportunity to accept a land donation from an anonymous donor, for 31 acres located on Foothill Road. The Board is being asked to approve Resolution 17-5, authorizing President Karas to accept the donation and sign documents related to the donation of land. Kelly Stimpson moved that the Board of Trustees approve Resolution 17-5, Donation and Conveyance of Land. Trustee Thomas Harding seconded the motion. With no further discussion, the motion carried unanimously with seven (7) "yes" votes.

#### G. Board of Trustees Events Calendar

President Karas reviewed the Trustees' events calendar and noted that the college will be closed December 23, 2016-January 2, 2017 for the semester break. The college will be closed on Monday, January 17, for the Martin Luther King Holiday and Spring Semester classes will begin on Tuesday, January 17. The January Board of Trustees' meeting is scheduled for Monday, January 23, 2017.
