Campus Rec & Intramurals

- The semester wrapped up with the annual Ugly Christmas Sweater bowling night with 39
- participants. There have been a total of 234 students who have participated in the Campus Rec
- and Intramurals program for fall semester. A variety of sports activities were offered this fall as
- 46 well as gaming events, trivia, bingo and bowling. Campus Rec & Intramurals continue to work
- with the community—specifically, Pick's Bowling Alley, Montana Sports Indoors, Kids Sports

Complex and Stillwater Christian School—to offer a variety of activities and intramural sports for students.

Student Engagement

The focus of this past month has been on opening the new FVCC Food Pantry. The pantry opened on December 11 in time to provide students needed resources prior to the semester break and the official grand opening in January. So far the Food Panty has collected 653 pounds of food and has room for at least another 1,200 pounds. The third annual Cookie Decorate and Donate event held on December 2 was a success. About 230 cookies were decorated and packaged by 18 volunteers for the Flathead County Meals on Wheels program. The Student Engagement Office also hosted a CASA Giving Tree toy drive which concluded on December 12. Toys received were distributed to foster children in Flathead County.

B. Faculty and Staff

 Laura VanDeKop attended the 43^{rd} AMATYC Annual Conference (American Mathematical Association of Two Year Colleges) November 9-12 in San Diego. She also presented a short topic on Egyptian Fractions in the "Engaging Future Teachers with Concepts of Rational Numbers" themed session and presented a full session on creating Islamic art with Euclidean Geometry.

Chris Moore and the Heavy Equipment Operations 105 and 110 classes finished building a pad for a new playground at Smith Fields in Whitefish. Project Whitefish Kids, Inc. is a Montana nonprofit corporation organized to construct the Smith Field Complex, a \$1.2 million-dollar facility dedicated to youth sports.

Tim Price, Jurek Koziol, and Effat Rady started the STEM challenge a year ago through a FVCC enhancement grant. The group has met with the high schools and provided them with a tutorial, parts, and some coaching so they can build small autonomous vehicles. In February we will have the second contest at FVCC to see which vehicles can best navigate the prescribed course. Currently Bigfork, Libby, Flathead, Columbia Falls, Whitefish, and Linderman schools, as well as Heritage home school are involved.

 Eliza Thomas and the Early Childhood Program have been hosting an advisory council of local community early childhood partners to investigate program offerings, assessments, and future practicum experiences and expectations for our early childhood students. Participation has been fantastic and input has been invaluable. The third and final meeting for the year is next week. The Early Childhood Center has begun implementing physical activity and art experiences for the children as part of the grant the center received. Children are getting martial arts experience and hands on art time with a local business and a local not-for profit museum. As the semester winds down the ECC reflects on the volume of observations the lab school was able to accommodate -- from our EDU 201 course, to the early childhood courses, to the UM 2+2 education students, and even far reaching to Glacier High School's early childhood students. The lab school is serving many variations of students and learners. Recently, the early childhood program also participated in the Career Fair hosted by Glacier High School to talk to freshman about education and career opportunities in the field of education generally speaking, and early childhood specifically.

 Craig Naylor's band works (three of them), Lullaby for a Sweet Soul, Snow Falling Softly, and Joshua Fought the Battle of Jericho, are now distributed by Aamano Music. His two compositions, Kiai, for wind ensemble and Our Voices, For Now, Sustained, for Vocal Chamber Music (a setting of six poems from Claudia Emerson's Pulitzer-winning Late Wife), are semi-finalists for the prestigious American Prize. The American Prize celebrates American excellence in the arts with recognition and reward to America's finest performing artists, ensembles and composers based on recorded performances.

V. COLLEGE ISSUES

A. Student Success: Library Update

Susan Matter, Director, Library Services, updated the Board on the current college library. Susan noted that the Library is offering a variety of new technology based learning applications for students. Some of these include PRIMO, a one stop search application, a library research guide and Montana Academic Library Consortium where students can access over 200,000 e-books. The library has taught over 53 classes this past year on topics such as how to effectively research and access databases. Susan noted that some of the projects for the coming year that she hopes to make available are virtual reality and virtual reality platforms designed to give students a hands-on learning tool in their local library. From July 2017-December 2017, students have accessed 58,433 databases, checked-out 4,000 different materials and 24,000 individuals accessed the library.

B. Board Policy, Chapter IX, Section 10, Planning and Research (First Reading)

The Board was presented with Board Policy, Chapter IX, Section 10, Planning and Research, first reading. After review, <u>Tom McElwain moved that the Board of Trustees approve Board Policy, Chapter IX, Section 10, Planning and Research (First Reading). Peter Akey seconded the motion.</u> With no further discussion, <u>the motion carried unanimously with six</u> (6) "yes" votes.

C. Board of Trustees Events Calendar

President Karas reviewed the Trustees' events calendar and noted that the next regularly scheduled Board meeting is Monday, January 22, 2018. The college will be closed for winter break December 23, 2017-January 2, 2018. An All Employee In-Service will be held on January 17, 2018 and spring semester will begin on January 22.

D. President's Update

President Karas updated the Board on several items:

- Phi Theta Kappa held its recent induction ceremony on November 30.
- An all employee holiday luncheon and enhancement grant program was held on December 15. Employees were able to enjoy a nice holiday luncheon and the Enhancement Grants were announced and awarded during a short program during the luncheon.
