# C. Commissioner of Higher Education Report

Angela McLean, Director of American Indian/Minority Achievement and K-12 Partnerships, presented the Board with an update from the Commissioner's office. An update was given on the American Indian Scholar Program, Year One. It is noted that American Indian students constitute only 5% of our student population in the MUS. There is also a low retention and completion rate for our American Indian students. Only 52.6% of American Indian students return for their second year at their starting institution in the MUS. The American Indian and Minority Achievement Partnership launched the American Indian Scholars Spring 2016. Following the launch of the program this year, 43 Student Scholars have been identified throughout the Montana University System. The Scholar Program planning for year two, will begin in June.

#### V. COLLEGE ISSUES

## A. Student Success: Summer Experience

Brenda Hanson, Dean of Students, presented the Board with an update on Summer Experience. Summer Experience started in 2014 with 28 students. The Summer Experience program is designed for high school students who will be entering their junior or senior years in the fall. The program offers students the opportunity to earn free college credits during the summer. Students can choose from several different courses and can earn up to four college credits. Some of the course offerings include American History, College Writing, Psychology, Programming with Java I and Interpersonal Communications. In addition, students will have the opportunity to explore career options, participate in intramural activities and engage in service learning projects. The program has experienced tremendous growth over the past three years. The program began in 2014 with 28 students and in 2015 had grown to 39 students. For the 2016 session, there are 80 students registered to participate in the program. Summer Experience participants have consistently returned to FVCC upon their completion of high school to continue their education.

#### B. Preliminary Summer Enrollment Report

Maya Tsidulko, Institutional Research Analyst, presented the Board with an update on preliminary summer enrollment. Maya noted that the preliminary summer enrollment is currently up 24.7 FTE or an increase of 11.5% from the same time last year. Total headcount is up 33 or an increase of 5.1% from the same time last year. Some of the factors that have effected enrollment include a large increase of Running Start students. Running Start had an increase of 47 students for a 53% over the same period last year. Additional factors include continued enrollment growth in programs such as the Summer Experience, and Teacher's Camp.
