B. Faculty

Faculty presented the Board with a written Faculty and Staff report.

Christina Relyea - Presented the honors interdisciplinary course model for 2-year colleges at the National Collegiate Honors Council meeting in Seattle during the remnants of a typhoon. Luckily her presentation wasn't a wash. She also attended a Campus Compact workshop in San Diego that encourages schools to create a campus civic action plan. She is part of the team lead by Wendy Jeschke to create a civic engagement and action plan for FVCC.

David Long - On October 16th chemistry faculty Shasha Sun, David Long, and Janice Alexander attended the fall meeting of the Montana section of the American Chemical Society at Fairmont hot springs. Three students- Jill Brown, Heather Fraley, and William Pardispresented their chemical research projects at the meeting. Ms. Brown and Ms. Fraley recently earned bachelor's degrees from U of M. They have come to FVCC to take additional science classes and participate in research prior to making applications to graduate schools. Mr. Pardis is currently an engineering student at MSU Bozeman. All three students presented work they performed here at the college.

Karl Babij - Will be playing Scrooge in "A Christmas Carol" Adapted and directed by Rebecca Spear.

Dr. Janice Alexander attended the 252nd ACS (American Chemical Society) meeting in Philadelphia as the Montana Local Section Councilor August 20-25, 2016. She brought the 2016 National Chemistry Experiment "Glow it Up" to two of Karen Hutchisons 8th grade science classes at Kalispell Middle School October 26th. They assisted students in handson experiments involving chemiluminesence. In addition, part of her sabbatical work has just been published in the peer reviewed ACS Symposium Series: NMR Spectroscopy in the Undergraduate Curriculum: First Year and Organic Chemistry Courses Volume 2.

The book chapter *NMR Spectroscopy in First-Year Chemistry at the University of Technology Sydney* details the project taken on by Janice and her UTS colleagues to incorporate NMR (nuclear magnetic resonance) spectroscopy into the first year chemistry classes at UTS, a

large University of 39,000 students. FVCC was one of the pioneers, first incorporating NMR into first year chemistry classes in the 1990's.

James Goudy - Daniel Church and Will Brensdall two recent graduates of FVCC computer transfer program won first place in Code 24, a 24-hour hackathon held at MSU in October. Peter Lainer former graduate of FVCC was a guest speaker at the computer club. He spoke about web design.

Nichole Sanford - Student concerts on November 18th (private instruction students and choir) and November 30th (string students and choir).

Gregg Davis - Attended a national conference on teaching economics at the college level in Tampa, Florida. Over 150 economists from all over the U.S. and Canada hob-knobbed on the best ways to keep economics relevant. Probably the best take-away is that maybe some of the economic modalities have changed, and that "new economies" may behave differently from the old ones. Reassuring since the econ classes here talk about this practically every day.

C. Monthly Reports

1. Executive Staff Activities Report

The Board of Trustees thanked the Executive Staff for their informative reports. Trustees noted all the hard work faculty and staff do every day to continue to make FVCC an amazing place for students.

D. Commissioner of Higher Education Report

Deputy Commissioner, Academic and Student Affairs, John Cech, presented the Board with an update from the Commissioner's Office. Deputy Commissioner Cech shared information with the Board on the Carl D. Perkins Grant and Strengthening Big Sky Pathways funds. Approximately \$500,000 has been allocated and divided among nine campuses to focus on developing pathways between high school and colleges across the state. One of the goals is to strengthen and grow career and technical dual enrollment opportunities across the state. The State Executive Leadership Team, which consists of the Office of the Commissioner of Higher Education (OCHE) and the Office of Public Instruction (OPI), met in Helena to reinforce the desire to grow dual enrollment at the career and technical education level across the state. Dual enrollment has recently doubled across the state. Deputy Commissioner Cech also noted that Montana is a finalist for a two-million-dollar grant that is being funded by the JP Morgan Chase Foundation. This grant is a joint application from OCHE and OPI. If funded the grant will help the state grow pathways and dual enrollment at the career and technical education level. In addition, the grant will help to grow work based learning experiences.

V. COLLEGE ISSUES

A. Student Success: Agriculture Program

Dr. Heather Estrada, Assistant Professor/Program Director, Agriculture, was in attendance to update the Board on the college's Ag Program. Dr. Estrada noted that the Ag Program is currently in its fourth year. Students who participate in FVCC's transfer ag program are able to transfer to Montana State University and usually pursue studies in agricultural education, farm and ranch management, crop science, and sustainable food and bio systems. Students in the college's Associate of Applied Science Program in Agriculture are participating in off campus internships and are becoming involved in the local community. The Campus Farm continues to be one of the Ag Programs greatest resources. The farm is starting to become quite established after three years of soil building and infrastructure building. The farm produces about

10,000 pounds of food each year and the farm earns about \$15,000 each year through farm shares and produce sold via the Eagle's Nest. Approximately half of the funds that are earned each year via the campus farm are put back into scholarships for students. The program will be hosting the upcoming 14th Annual Montana Organic Association Conference with 200 people registered to attend. Farmers from across the state, scientific researches and potential employers will be present so students will be attending the conference and will be presenting research posters at the conference. The brewing program will be incorporated into the conference and be given an opportunity to connect organic growers and producers with the program to possibly create a pathway to the organic brewing industry. The program will continue to expand and this year the ag students will focus on growing some malt barley and some hops so the brewing students can practice brewing with malt barley and hops.

B. Financial Aid Year End Report

Brenda Hanson, Dean of Students, presented the Board with the Financial Aid Year End Report. It was noted that the FVCC's Cohort Default rate continues to decrease considerably in large part due to increased student financial counseling and literacy training. During the academic year 2015-16, the Financial Aid Office made awards to and/or processed assistance for 1,505 students. There were 1,923 degree/certificate seeking students for 2015-16 and of those, 1,294 or 67% received some type of aid processed through the financial aid office.

C. Tenure Recommendations

President Karas indicated faculty members Heather Estrada, Assistant Professor/Program Director, Agriculture; James Goudy, Assistant Professor, Computer Science/Web Technology; Douglas Harling, Assistant Professor, Jewelry; David Long, Assistant Professor, Chemistry; Conrad Rauscher, Assistant Professor, English and David Regan, Assistant Professor, Art, submitted portfolios for tenure review. President Karas reported that she, the Tenure Committee, Interim Vice President of Academic Affairs (Instruction and Student Services), Darlene Schottle, and the Board of Trustees Personnel Committee had reviewed the applications. Based on the recommendations of the Tenure Review Committee and Vice President, Darlene Schottle, President Karas recommended tenure for Heather Estrada, James Goudy, Douglas Harling, David Long, Conrad Rauscher and David Regan. Kelly Stimpson moved that the Board of Trustees approve the recommendations for tenure for faculty members Heather Estrada, James Goudy, Douglas Harling, David Long, Conrad Rauscher and David Regan. Callie Langohr seconded the motion. With no further discussion, the motion carried unanimously with five (5) "yes" votes.

D. Geospatial Technology Certificate

On October 28, the Curriculum Committee voted to approve a Certificate in Geospatial Technology. The Board was presented with the certificate program. Jeremy Presta moved that the Board of Trustees approve the Geospatial Technology Certificate. Kelly Stimpson seconded the motion. Upon further discussion, Tim Eichner, Associate Professor, Surveying/Natural Resources noted that Geospatial Technology is the study of and use of equipment used in contributing to the geographic and geospatial data mapping, analysis, visualization and measurement of earth's features, typically involving systems such as GPS (Global Positioning Systems), GIS (geographical information systems) and RS (remote sensing). With no further discussion, the motion carried unanimously with five (5) "yes" votes.

E. Earth Science: GIS/Planning, Associate of Science Degree

The Board was presented with the Earth Science, GIS/Planning, Associate of 1 2 Science Degree program for review and information. The Board does not need to approve an 3 AAS degree. This degree is already offered this is just adding the GIS/Planning option. 4 5 F. Environmental Science: Geospatial Technology Option, Associate of Science 6 7 The Board was presented with the Environmental Science, Geospatial Technology Option, 8 Associate of Science Degree program for review and information. The Board does not need to 9 approve this AAS degree. This degree is already offered this is just adding the geospatial technology 10 option. 12

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G. Board of Trustees Events Calendar

President Karas reviewed the Trustees' events calendar and noted that the college will be closed December 23, 2016-January 2, 2017 for the semester break. The December Board of Trustees' meeting is scheduled for Monday, December 19.

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H. President's Update

President Karas updated the Board on several items:

- President Karas noted that the Board of Regents held their recent meeting November 17-18 in Missoula. The Regents reviewed the recent programs that the Board approved at the October Board meeting, the Medical Lab Technology, AAS program and the Programming and Game Development, AAS.
- Student Housing continues to move along. A meeting will be held in the near future to determine furniture requirements and placement for units. As soon as is possible, a tour will be set up for Board members so that they can see the progress.
- The upcoming 65th Legislative Session is scheduled to begin on January 2. President Karas will be in Helena. The three community colleges will be addressing some language changes to a few statutes in addition to addressing the current funding formula and how it was presented in the recent Governor's Budget. President Karas will also be connecting with our local area legislators and will invite the Board to attend once that meeting has been scheduled.
