A. Student Success: Early Childhood Center Update and CACFP Report Renee August, Manager, Early Childhood Center and Eliza Thomas, Assistant

Professor, Education, presented the Board with an update on the Early Childhood Center and the Child and Adult Care Food Program. The center currently participates in the Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP). This program provides aid to child and adult care institutions and family or group day care homes for the provision of nutritious foods. The center continues to work with outside groups to promote its leading lab school environment. The center provides educational opportunities for FVCC students, University of Montana students and students from Glacier High School. The Early Childhood Center is a member of the Best Beginnings Community Council and continues to grow in the Montana Best Beginnings STARS to Quality program. The program works as a quality rating scale that supports improvement of participating child care programs in the state. The center received its STAR 4 rating and is currently working toward the STAR 5 rating. A STAR 5 rating will mean the center will become a nationally accredited childcare center. The center currently has 48 children enrolled with a long wait list. The Center recently obtained national accreditation. The center earned accreditation by the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC). The center earned accreditation by NAEYC after completing an extensive three-year process. To earn the accreditation, the center went through an extensive self-study and quality-improvement process, followed by an on-site visit by NAEYC accreditors to verity and ensure that the center and its program met each of the ten program standards and hundreds of corresponding individual criteria. Less than 10 percent of all child care centers, preschools and kindergartens in the nation have earned NAEYC accreditation.

B. ACCT National Legislative Summit Reports

Trustees Shannon Lund, Mark Holston, Lyle Mitchell and Peter Akey attended the ACCT annual Conference in San Francisco, October 16-18. Each Trustee reported on attending several sessions in which they were provided with relevant information. The Trustees appreciated the opportunity to attend the conference and each gained some valuable insight.

C. Finance and Audit Committee Report

The Finance and Audit Committee met prior to the Board meeting. The committee reported that they received a review of the presented Quarterly Finance Report.

Beckie Christiaens, Vice-President, Chief Financial Officer, Finance and Administration, presented the Board with the Quarterly Finance Report, ending September 30, 2019.

ATTACHMENT II 1 2 **Faculty Activity Report** 3 October 2019 4 5 6 **Stephanie Paidas - Assistant Professor - Psychology** 7 Dr. Stephanie Paidas offered a local "fall tour" on child development and screen time. In addition 8 to her September keynote address on the benefits and risks of screen exposure in infancy, 9 toddlerhood, and early childhood, she supported Glacier High School's Parent University viewing of the documentary "Screenagers" on October 3, 2019. At that event Stephanie co-10 facilitated community discussion about the risks of screen time in adolescence and what parents 11 12 can do to set limits with their teens. 13 14 Stephanie and Amy Pearson continue their Honor's course, Wilderness Experience and 15 Expression, focused on environmental psychology and communications. They completed a weekend camping trip with students in September, when all 16 students successfully avoided use 16 17 of their screen devices! (aided greatly by the lack of cell service and internet at Bowman Lake 18 where they were camping). 19 20 **Gregg Davis - Professor - Economics** 21 Dr. Gregg Davis was invited in September to the annual meeting of the Montana Hospital 22 Association in Billings, MT, to present his research on the economic contribution of Montana's 23 private hospitals to the Montana economy. The research focused on the economy-wide contributions in terms of employment and labor income, and the dynamics of the Medicaid 24 25 expansion. 26 27 **Michael Severino - Associate Professor - Mathematics** Dr. Michael Severino recently began working with the Kalispell Police Department on a 28 29 statistical analysis for their staffing needs. This venture will form the basis for a future undergraduate research project. 30 31 32 Janice Heil - Associate Professor - Physical Therapy Assistant This month, Associate Professors Janice Heil and Dr. Julie Robertson will be attending an 33 34 Educational Leadership Conference in Bellevue, WA to meet with PT and PTA educators around the nation. They will also travel to Missoula to meet with the University of Montana PT program 35 36 to discuss and practice scenarios related to the PT/PTA relationship. 37 38 Also, all eight of this year's PTA students passed their licensing board exam, earning the program a 100% pass rate, compared to the national pass rate of 85%. 39 40 41 Jeff Sanders - Adjunct Professor - Native American Studies Dr. Jeff Sanders was invited to give a keynote address at the 51st Annual Governor's Conference 42 on Aging in Billings, MT Sept. 23.
