This course will help FVCC create two tracks for students, a career and technical writing track and a transfer writing track. Both are equal credit 100 level tracks.

# B. Board Policy, Chapter XII – Facilities Section 10-Design and Planning to Section 70-No Camping – Second Reading

#### C. Annual Snow and Ice Removal Contract

President Karas stated that the college conducted a RFP for 625,000 square feet of parking lots and roadways that we manage during the winter months. Two bids were received, a committee compared the bids and scored them. It is recommended that the Board accept the lower bid from APEX.

Trustee Travis Steindorf moved that the Board of Trustees approve APEX's bid for snow and ice removal. Trustee Patrick Gulick seconded the motion. With no further discussion, the motion carried unanimously with seven (7) "yes" votes.

# D. Founders Hall Keyless Access System

President Karas reported that the current keyless access system in Founders Hall is archaic and the components are no longer being made to retain or replace the doors in the building. It is recommended that the Board approve the installation of the ASSA Abloy Keyless Access Control System, it is the same system as the Wachholz College Center. There is only one company, Systems Northwest, certified to install the system in both buildings. These circumstances are justification for an exemption from the routine procurement rules and the Board was asked to approve the investment of \$169,899.

Trustee Patrick Gulick moved that the Board of Trustees approve moving forward with the contract with Systems Northwest to install the ASSA Abloy Keyless Access Control System in Founders Hall. Trustee Kelly Stimpson seconded the motion. With no further discussion, the motion carried unanimously with seven (7) "yes" votes.

President Karas reviewed the Trustees event calendar. The College will be closed

#### Student Engagement – Wendy Jeschke

In addition to supporting the student organization in their club efforts, the Student Engagement Office coordinated a Student Organization Orientation for all clubs and advisors. Also, a two-day Student Leadership Retreat was held in September at Trinity Lutheran Camp on Flathead Lake. Twelve students learned about personality and leadership styles, communications, effective meetings, parliamentary procedure and event planning.

Additional activities for the month included a Constitution Day Celebration, Voter Registration Day, Native American Heritage Day, and a Hispanic Heritage Month celebration. The attendance at these events and others have increased over last year.

An Involvement Fair took place on campus with several local non-profits and student organizations in attendance to encourage volunteerism and involvement. The following week, several community involvement presentations were given in classes to promote on and off campus volunteer opportunities.

The Food Pantry is now open additional hours with assistance from a student worker. The focus has been on re-stocking, promoting the pantry, stocking snack baskets around campus, and making a Hungry Student Cookbook more assessable to all students. The pantry received two significant donations in September. A local couple donated \$1500 and All Saints' Episcopal Church donated \$1325. #### Health Sciences Program Director - Surgical Technology - Robyn Hoggat -

The surgical technology program had an open house on September 19<sup>th</sup> and 20<sup>th</sup> to celebrate National Surgical Technologists Week and promote the profession.
