F. President's Report

- Legislative Update The appropriations committee passed House Bill 2, Section E. The bill was approved with the amendments that were put in in the joint appropriations sub-committee executive action including increasing the weights and the values from the Governor's budget for FTE. They did not put any money back into FVCC's base budget. There is a draft bill that would provide one-time only funds for all three community colleges for the biennium to expand existing and develop new career and technical education programs. Our budget committee met once and will meet again next week, tuition and fee recommendations will be made at the next Board meeting.
- Wachholz College Center (WCC) Continues to be successful, public and private entities have been renting spaces.

VI. EXECUTIVE SESSION



Math Faculty

- Charlie Katerba, Laura VanDeKop, and Eliza Thomas (social sciences division) attended the Achieving the Dream DREAM 2023 conference in Chicago February 14-17. They attended a variety of sessions and brought back ideas for data governance, the Teaching and Learning Center, and scheduling.
- The **math division** hosted its annual Pi Day celebration and fundraiser on Tuesday, March 14 from 11am-12:30pm in the library. They served a collection of homemade and store-bought pie donated by current and former FVCC faculty and staff, and also collected donations to go toward the Math Excellence Fund. This fund gives monetary awards for math excellence at FVCC and local middle and high schools.

Science & Engineering Faculty

- **Tim Price** met with an aerospace engineering class at Glacier High School and lectured on propulsion systems, particularly those used on commercial aircraft.
- Christina Relyea, Tim Eichner, Rick Trembath, and John Fraley are teaching a Senior Institute class that surveys current and historical topics in natural resource management. The course includes discussions of invasive species both terrestrial and aquatic, common diseases and pests of trees, historical and future fire in NW Montana, wildlife species and a history of wildlife conservation, and an investigation of our natural world through the lens of technology including Earth observation satellites and drone technology.


Social Sciences Faculty

- Wendy Jeschke, student engagement coordinator, and Eliza Thomas, faculty in early childhood and elementary education, coordinated DREAMville on March 7 on campus for area second graders to explore diversity, reading, engineering, art and math. FVCC staff and student volunteers from across campus made the day possible. Six FVCC graduates now in their teacher education program through the University of Montana Teacher Education Program presented the lessons each tied to state content standards and the essential understandings for Indian Education for All. The second graders learned a traditional American Indian game called "Rock in the Fist" for diversity. In reading, students learned about storytelling and the essential components of a good story. During engineering, students learned how to design and redesign paper airplanes. In art, students mixed primary colors with black and white paint to create mini landscapes. For math, students learned about the history of dice and made their own dice to graph their rolling results. After both the morning and afternoon session, students received a snack, a free book, and a FVCC water bottle. Students were overheard saying, "I want to attend FVCC someday" and "I wish I lived here!" Area schools participating this year were Bigfork, Kalispell Public Schools (Edgerton and Elrod), and Helena Flats.
- In partnership with **Morgan Ray**, director of library services, **Eliza Thomas** presented note taking strategies to students, staff and faculty during two library offerings of Infodoodling (Information + Doodling = Understanding). The offerings were colorful, fast-paced and full of doodles as a way to increase

- comprehension of content. In early April, Eliza and TRIO Director **Leslie Greene** will provide the same information to students involved in the TRIO program.
- Salish Kootenai College Director of Early Childhood Amy Burland presented to FVCC's early childhood students and recent graduates. She shared an opportunity for students to work on their Bachelor's Degree in Early Childhood through a grant. Students can receive tuition, fees and books. Several FVCC graduates have enrolled and are beginning their four-year degree.
- Early childhood program students, Director Eliza Thomas and a Birds' Nest educator and current FVCC early childhood student participated in a video about early childhood education. The video is available on YouTube (https://youtu.be/2aKZIOiXlmI) and/or on the Social Sciences page.

Faculty Classroom Happenings

- On March 14, the **music program** hosted the Middle School Orchestra Festival which included 122 middle school students on the McClaren stage. The guest clinician was FVCC's string instructor **Kyara Nelson**.
- On March 3, the **STEM Colloquium** was pleased to welcome FVCC alumnus **Nick Glynos** to speak on his PhD work at the University of Michigan. Nick presented, "A Historical Perspective and Some Recent Findings on DMT A Naturally Occurring Psychedelics," to a packed house of faculty, students and community members. Many thought it was one of the best STEM Colloquiums they had seen.
- Science and engineering faculty **Tim Eichner** and FVCC's remote sensing class hosted an urgent map-a-thon for the FVCC community to aid humanitarian relief efforts in response to the February 6 earthquake in southern Turkey.
