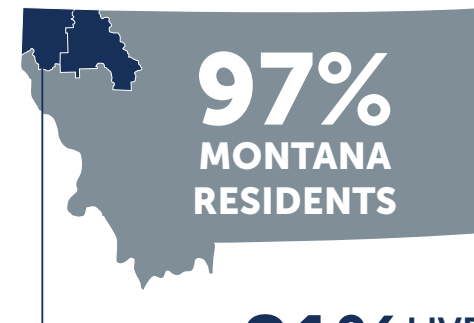

TRADES INSTITUTE: HEAVY METAL AND HIGH IMPACT

"Yes, that Metallica."

This phrase echoed across campus as FVCC was named one of only 18 colleges nationwide to receive a prestigious grant from Metallica's "All Within My Hands" Foundation through the Metallica Scholars Initiative. FVCC was awarded \$75,000 and is the only college in Montana selected for the program.

In the fall, more than 300 FVCC Trades Institute students received stipends to purchase essential tools and safety equipment. In the spring, the college used grant funding to launch a hands-on credential program, "Introduction to Building Trades," to further expand workforce readiness.

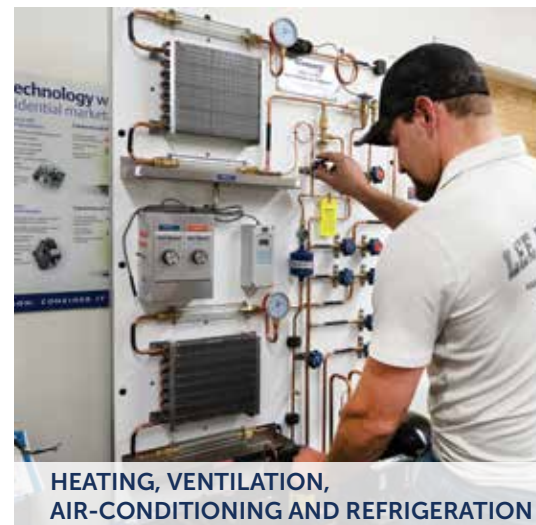

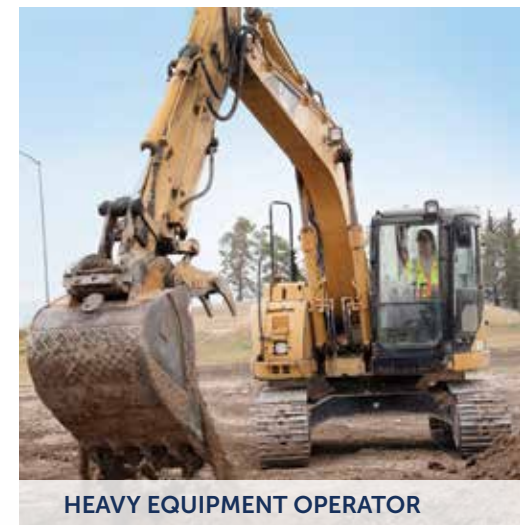

STATEWIDE IMPACT

Three FVCC programs are expanding access to education and strengthening Montana's workforce statewide.

The college's land surveying program is now fully online, combining virtual coursework with in-person labs led by licensed surveyors across Montana through a partnership with the Montana Association of Registered Land Surveyors. **Thanks to FVCC Foundation donors** who assisted in funding instruction of this innovative model, the program is now preparing students across the state for careers critical to Montana's growth and preservation.

FVCC's Medical Laboratory Technology program also offers a distance-hybrid option, partnering with clinical sites throughout Montana to train local students for in-demand lab careers. With a 100% certification pass rate and all students employed after graduating, the program is helping rural hospitals meet urgent workforce needs.

The paramedicine program has also expanded, offering distance cohorts in Bozeman and Cut Bank. Students complete their coursework through telehealth technology, then travel to campus for hands-on labs and gain real-world experience through clinical placements in communities across Montana.

PREPARING PROFESSIONALS MONTANA NEEDS

Across the state, the demand for well-trained professionals in health care and human services continues to rise.

At FVCC, programs in nursing, health sciences and substance abuse counseling are answering the call. With strong clinical and community partnerships, a focus on real-world experience and consistently high outcomes, our students are stepping into critical roles that support and strengthen Montana communities.

FVCC’s substance abuse counseling program saw strong enrollment this year, reflecting the growing need for trained professionals in Montana. The program prepares students for Licensed Addiction Counselor credentials with hands-on, practical training focused on real-world challenges. It’s a vital part of our college’s impact on addressing substance use and supporting healthier communities across the state.

Twenty students completed the Registered Nursing program, including three from FVCC’s Lincoln County campus, and eight earned their Practical Nursing credentials. Graduates in both programs achieved over 90% pass rates on their NCLEX exams, exceeding the national average. This strong success helps address local workforce needs by preparing capable and committed nurses who are already making an impact in clinics, hospitals and long-term care facilities throughout the region.

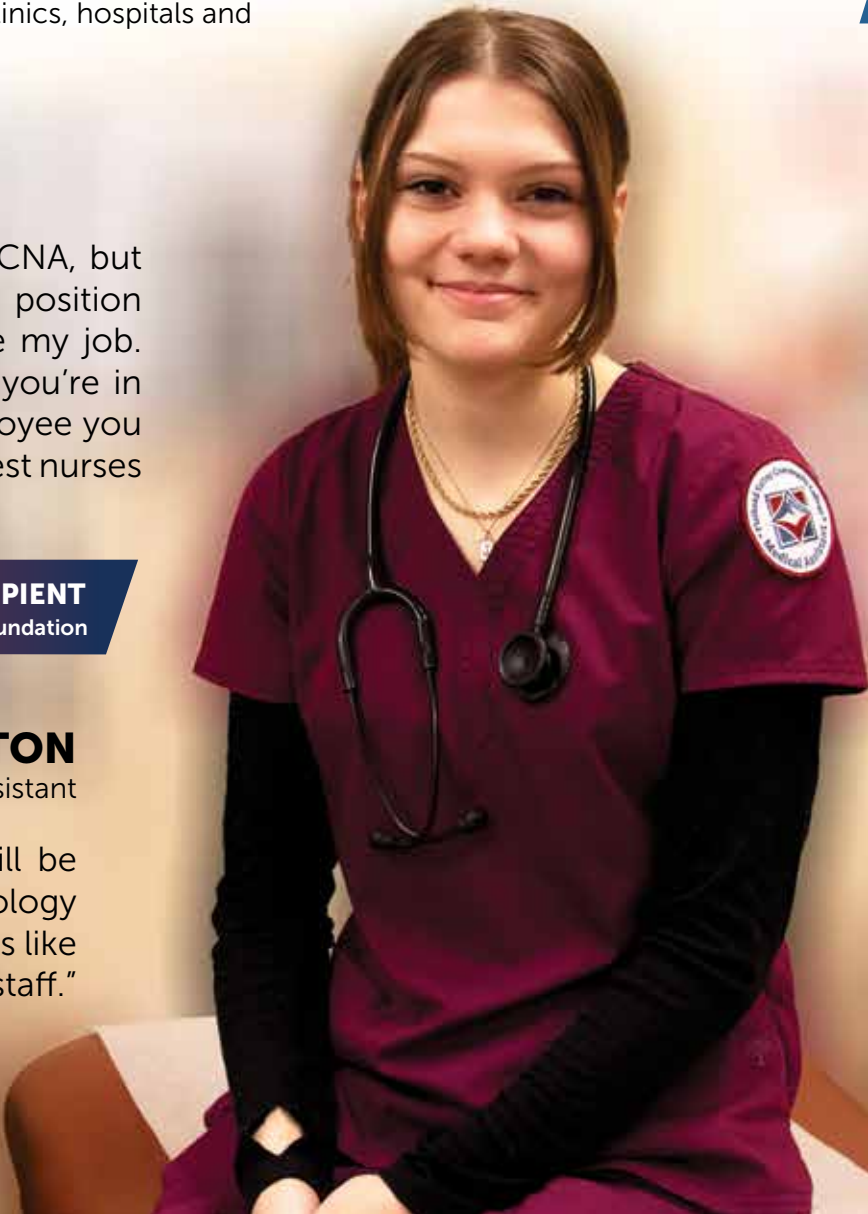

With affordable tuition, the option to stay close to home and the benefit of smaller class sizes, students receive personalized support from exceptional faculty every step of the way. FVCC transfer students save thousands of dollars while receiving a strong educational foundation that prepares them for success elsewhere. This model not only benefits students but also strengthens Montana's four-year institutions with well-prepared students to finish their bachelor's degrees.

For Katie Eberhardy, teaching isn't just part of her future—it's already part of her every day at FVCC.

2+2 PROGRAM

FVCC's 2+2 programs are a great option for in-district students looking to start close to home while saving on tuition. These partnerships with Montana universities allow students to complete their first two years at FVCC before transferring into bachelor's degree programs across the state.

ASU PARTNERSHIP

FVCC and Arizona State University have partnered to streamline the transfer process through the MyPath2ASU® program. This tool offers over 400 guided pathways, helping students seamlessly transfer from FVCC, maximize credits and reduce time to complete their degree.



COLLEGE BEGINS IN HIGH SCHOOL

FVCC's Running Start program continues to expand access to college for high school juniors and seniors across Montana.

Students earn their first six college credits tuition-free, with additional courses offered at half the in-district tuition rate. Courses are offered online, in high schools and at FVCC, allowing the flexibility for students to get a jump on college, save money and build confidence in their academic future.

FVCC TRIO supports students who are the first in their family to attend college, students with financial need and those with documented disabilities.

Through personalized advising, academic support and financial guidance, TRIO empowers more than 200 students each year to stay on track and reach their educational goals. Piper Hadley is a TRIO student mentor to help support students in the program.

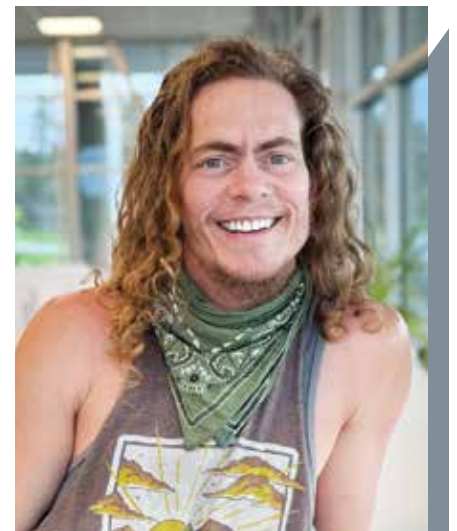

THE HONORS EDGE

The FVCC Honors Program offers students an opportunity to challenge themselves through small, discussion-based classes in a dedicated honors classroom, with courses that emphasize critical thinking, research and leadership.

Honors students receive scholarships that cover their tuition for up to two semesters as they complete the program's academic and service components.



HONORS STUDENTS IN DENVER

This spring, **with assistance from the FVCC Foundation**, nine honors students and two faculty members traveled to Denver for the Western Regional Honors Council Conference, where five students presented their research to peers and faculty from across the West. FROM HIGH SCHOOL EQUIVALENCY TO COLLEGE AND CAREER

Through in-person and online instruction, FVCC’s Adult Education program provides a path to a earn a high school diploma.

Students vary in age and life circumstances—they include youth who have withdrawn from school, adults seeking a second chance and immigrants working toward a better future. The 5-week program is “no cake walk” says instructor Pennie Parish.

FVCC staff help graduates take their next step, whether that means entering the workforce or continuing their education through one of FVCC’s programs. Beyond high school equivalency, Adult Education offers integrated training and workforce literacy that directly connect learners to local job opportunities. We collaborate with the Kalispell School District, local employers and **Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act partners such as Jobs for Montana’s Graduates, Job Service and Vocational Rehab**. Additionally, the judicial system refers individuals to our program as part of rehabilitation efforts.

After a successful career in restaurant management and her current role at the Montana Veterans’ Home, Tamara Fraser returned to school to earn the high school credential she narrowly missed by one credit, due to the birth of her son, 38 years ago. Despite her professional accomplishments, Tamara was determined to finally complete this milestone.

“It was the best decision I have ever made for myself,”

she shared during her heartfelt graduation speech. Her journey is a testament to the power of perseverance and the deeply personal meaning of educational achievement. She’s even considering returning to FVCC to pursue a nursing degree in the future.

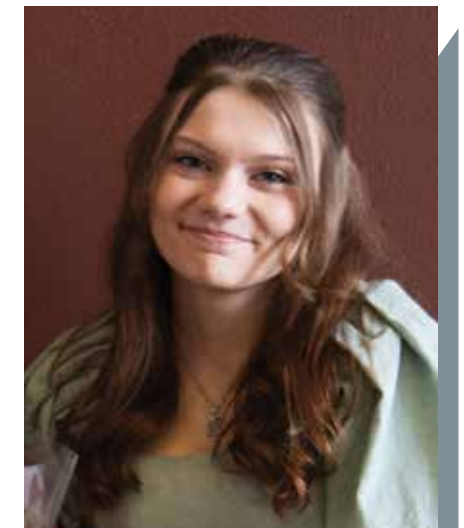

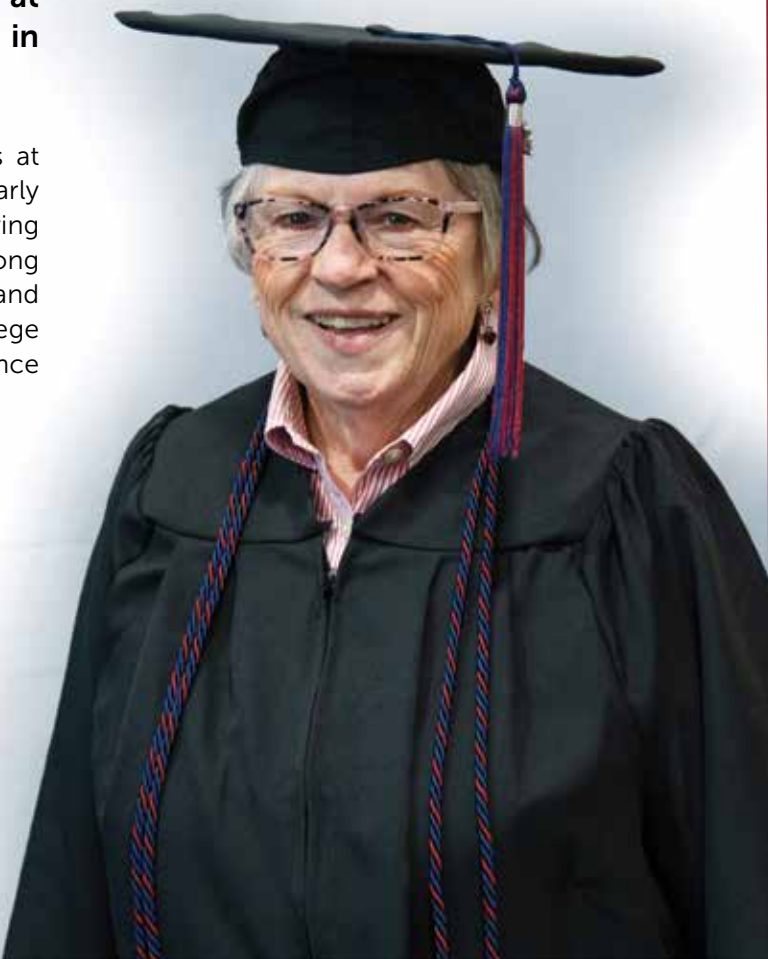

THE IMPACT OF GENEROSITY

The FVCC Foundation continues to create life-changing opportunities for students through scholarships and donor-supported initiatives. This past year, the Foundation provided more than \$2 million in scholarship support to 687 students.

This included nearly 300 high school equivalency tests for Adult Education students—removing financial barriers and helping more learners take the next step in their education or careers. The Foundation also awarded three new Transformation Scholarships, supporting students pursuing substance abuse counseling and small business development with up to \$20,000 each.

This year, FVCC was proud to honor Lucy Smith with the Eagle Award for her years of dedicated leadership, vision and generosity. A true supporter of her community, Lucy's volunteer work includes involvement with organizations such as the Glacier Symphony and Chorale, the Whitefish Community Foundation, Rotary, Women Who Wine, the Dana-Farber Cancer Institute and Literacy Volunteers.

The FVCC Foundation's flagship event, Festival of Flavors, raised over \$400,000 for student scholarships this year. In addition, the college received more than \$92,000 through the Great Fish Community Challenge, thanks to generous community contributions and a full match of \$14,500 from the Whitefish Community Foundation. The annual Bibler Home and Garden Strolls, held each spring and summer, raised over \$17,000 this year.

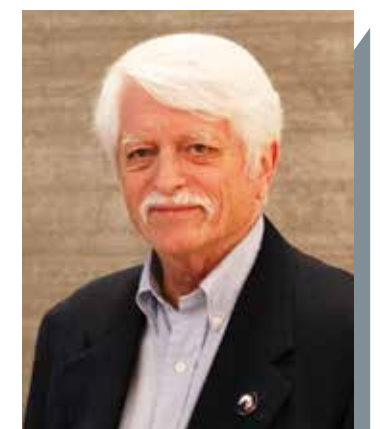

A RECIPE FOR OPPORTUNITY

Erin Abbott, FVCC Culinary Arts and Catering student, graduated this spring without student debt. Thanks to the generosity of scholarship donors, Erin has been able to focus on her education without the financial stress that holds many students back.

"Thanks to your scholarships and donors like you, absolutely none of this has come out of my own pocket," she shared at the Donor Scholarship Reception. "I've been able to work when I can, go to school and really focus on my studies."

Erin grew up in Bigfork, where her family faced a number of challenges. Her mother battled mental illness and passed away when Erin was young. A few years later, her father was seriously injured in a car accident. Although he made a remarkable recovery, the experience left a lasting impact, and the family experienced financial hardship. It wasn't until her later high school years that Erin began to see the path forward-thanks in large part to the support of her community and the opportunities available to her.

"I remembered all of the super kind adults growing up," she said. "These people are here to make a difference and I wanted to take advantage of that."

Erin applied for every scholarship she could find-writing essays, creating art and staying deeply involved in school activities. Her determination paid off.

With support from the FVCC Foundation and other community donors, Erin graduated debt-free and is ready for what's next.
