#### Janice Heil, PT, M.A., Physical Therapist Assistant

The PTA program started October events with the Night at the Broussard on October 2nd which showcased the nursing and health science students at FVCC. All of the PTA students participated in this community event. Over 100 community members participated in this event where they watched a simulation of a real patient experience as a patient traveled from the scene of an accident, then went to ER, surgery, ICU, rehab unit, outpatient doctor's office and PT and home. This event highlighted FVCC programs of Nursing, Emergency Medical Technician, Paramedics, Medical Lab Technologists, Physical Therapist Assistants, Surgical Technologists, Radiologic Technologists, Medical Assistants, Medical Coders and Phlebotomy.

Also in October, the program found out that their 2025 PTA graduates all passed their national licensing exam that they took in July and October. One hundred percent of the students who took the exam passed and all of them are working. The national pass rate is 80.4%. The graduated students are working in the following locations: Cabinet Peaks (Libby), Ortho Rehab (Dillon and Bigfork), Logan Health Inpatient PT (Kalispell), and Mountain Physical Therapy (Kalispell). Students need to receive a score of over 600 to pass, the national mean score is 648.1 and the FVCC PTA students' mean score was 685. Congratulations to their hard-working students and thank you to their community partners for hiring their PTA students!

Lastly, at the end of October, the program formally celebrated National Physical Therapy month with an event in Blake Hall where they offered 5-minute massages, grip testing, blood pressures, provided educational materials and gave away some treats and prizes.
